



WOSM Seeding Innovation and Impact

Have you been at the WOSM tent (Moot Plaza) already? Lot's of inspiring global Scout initiatives are presented there! You can get information on the Earth Tribe Movement (including the Plastic Tide Turners) and the Africa Scout Foundation offers a Copper Junior Membership for 10 USD only. The Kandersteg International Scout Centre (Switzerland) is being presented and do not hesitate to get informed about the Dialogue for Peace programme of WOSM and the International Dialogue Centre (KAICIID).

Another inspiring initiative in the WOSM tent is that of the Kenyan Scout Mary Petite. She is one of the 12 young people awarded the global Messengers of Peace Hero in 2019. She won with her 'Brown Olive Tree' project'. This innovative project grows seeds of the indigenous Brown Olive Tree which are donated to society. This initiative supports a sustainable society and a better eco-system. The fruits produced are food for birds. The insects get nectar from the flowers of the tree. Livestock eats the leaves and twigs. The tree enriches the humus and thus ground becomes more fertile, more birds are attracted, the trees produce wood and contributes to the the fight against global warming. A seed takes about half a year to grow to tree, so tree planting is a long term project. So far 816 plants have been donated!
